Selected facts about German and Germany:

- 1. Germany is the world's second largest exporter (as of 2010).
- 2. German is the most commonly spoken language in the EU.
- 3. 18% of the world's books are published in German. The German Wikipedia is the second largest in the world)
- 4. Germany is home to numerous international corporations, e.g. BASF, BAYER, BMW, Mercedes..
- 5. German is no harder to learn to speak and write than other languages. (Cognates: Arm, Nase, Hand, Vater, Butter,...)
- 6. German is the second-most commonly used scientific language.
- 7. German is the language of Goethe, Nietzsche and Kafka. Mozart, Bach, Beethoven, Freud and Einstein also spoke German.
- 8. Speaking and understanding German will deepen your knowledge of the culture and improve your employment opportunities.
- 9. Learning German provides deeper insights into a region that plays a vital role in central Europe's intellectual and economic life and in its cultural history.

German Major:

SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION TO THE GERMAN STUDIES MAJOR: Completion of GER 202 or GER 303 with a grade of "C" or better.

The major in German Studies is composed of **27 semester hours**, beginning with GER 225. The last section offers 4 classes from other departments that will be counted towards the 27 credits for the Major! Not a German Major yet, <u>apply here</u> and make an appointment with us. Credits begin with GER225 and higher. Students take 6 credits from group A and 6 credits from group B. German Majors can also take selected cross-listed courses: e.g. PLS 301, PLS 401, PHL 374, and PHL 459 count towards the Major!

Study Abroad: A minimum of 15 semester hours towards the major must be Creighton courses.

German Minor:

The Minor in German Studies is composed of **18 credit hours**, beginning with **GERMAN 225**. After a student has attained the proficiency of **GERMAN 304**, he/she must take at least 3 credits from *each* of Groups A and B. **Credits begin with GER 225**.

Study Abroad: A minimum of 15 semester hours towards the major must be Creighton courses.
