
Janousek Speaks with *Nebraska Examiner* about Election



Creighton Successfully Earns AAHRPP 5-Year Accreditation

The Association for the Accreditation of Human Research Protection Programs (AAHRPP) notified the Research Compliance Office in December that the University successfully completed the site visit that had occurred earlier in the fall and that Creighton University has been reaccruited for five years to perform human subjects' research. The University was awarded its initial accreditation in December 2011 and has been continuously accredited since. AAHRPP accreditation offers assurances to research participants, researchers, sponsors, government regulators, and the general public that an organization's human research protection program (HRPP) is focused first and foremost on excellence.

Peck Leads Task Force on Animal Physical Therapy

Kirk Peck, PhD, associate professor of physical therapy, has been appointed as chair of a special task for the Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy to draft regulatory language in support of animal physical therapy. The Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy is a national organization supporting leadership in state jurisdictions focused on protecting the public by promoting safe and competent physical therapy practice. In line with its mission, the federation created this special task force to draft national model practice language that can be used by state jurisdictions to formally regulate physical therapists educated in a niche area of practice to treat animals in collaboration with the veterinary profession. Task force members include professionals from other state physical therapy and veterinary licensure boards with a 12-month goal to complete its directive.

Building Expertise in Human-Centered Design
