Wong, McLaughlin Publish New Quantum Algorithm in Journal *Physical Review A*

Molly McLaughlin, a senior physics and mathematics double major, and Tom Wong, PhD, associate professor of physics, have published a new quantum algorithm that searches certain databases or networks faster than existing quantum algorithms. The research, which was published in the journal Physical Review A in March 2025, explores how a quantum computer might search a network with two groups of nodes, where each node in one group is connected to every node in the other group.

Marshall Study Explores How Indigenous Employees Experience, Manage Workplace Conflict

In a recent study published in the <u>Canadian Journal of Behavioural Science</u>, **Jason Marshall**, **PhD**, assistant professor of management, and his research team explore how Indigenous employees experience and manage workplace conflict. By integrating both Western and Indigenous scientific methods, they analyzed quantitative and qualitative data from surveys and interviews. Their findings suggest that Indigenous relationality — encompassing connections among human and nonhuman beings, cultural and community obligations, and long-term temporal considerations—can broaden the scope of Western conflict management theories and practices.

Knezevich and Team Receive \$100,000 Grant to Support Families of Children with Type 1 Diabetes

Emily Knezevich, PharmD, professor of pharmacy practice and member of a research team headed by Vanessa Jewell, PhD, from the University of North Carolina, received a \$100,000 grant from the American Occupational Therapy Foundation to fund a feasibility trial for the REAL-Fam OT coaching model that provides families of children and adolescents with Type 1 diabetes with support and coaching to help improve family quality of life. The grant begins on July 1 and Knezevich will provide education and training to families enrolled in continuous glucose monitoring (CGM) as well as provide input to the OT interventionalists on trends seen in the CGM reports throughout the trial.

Sabbaticals from Great Plains IDeA

Creighton's Institute for Population Health (IPH) and Kingfisher Institute invited students across its undergraduate, graduate and professional schools to consider what "population health" looked like to them and to enter the second annual Envisioning Population Health Student Photo Contest. The challenge this year offered three categories: Mental Health and Well-Being; Planetary Health; and Social Determinants of Health. Schlegel Center CREW for Health Justice

The Schlegel Center for Service and Justice partnered with the IPH to develop and pilot a program that intentionally integrates student-led discussion about social determinants of health with direct service and community engagement to help prehealth students build empathy for their future patients and learn how to use their voice to advocate for health justice. The inaugural program drew more than 35 student participants, all who plan to become healthcare professionals. They participated in weekly 90-minute discussions to facilitate a deeper understanding of the CDC's social determinants of health. Shipman Presents Grand Rounds at Iowa and Dartmouth

In April, **Scott Shipman, MD, MPH**, executive director for the Institute for Population Health and CyncHealth Endowed Professor in Population Health, presented a Grand Rounds lecture for Dartmouth University's School of Medicine in April. His remarks, "Optimizing Care at the Primary Care-Subspecialty Level," focused on healthcare referral trends in the U.S., challenges in timely specialty access and loss or leakage of referrals that healthcare systems struggle to address. He focused on the need for better communication and coordination between primary care and specialty care, and shared his lessons learned in working with health systems to address these needs. Later in April, he chaired the annual steering committee meeting for the Eugene S. Farley, Jr. Health Policy Center - University of Colorado, located on the Anschutz Medical Campus. He also presented Grand Rounds for the University of lowa Carver School of Medicine's Frontiers in Pediatric Research Lecture Series in March, where he was the inaugural invited professor for a speaker series aimed at building interest and infrastructure for health services research at the University of lowa.
