Witmer Presents Research Papers on Native American Politics

Rick Witmer, PhD, professor of political science and international relations and the Rev. John P. Schlegel, SJ, Distinguished Professor of Government and Politics, presented two papers at the 2025 Southern Political Science Association Conference in January in San Juan, Puerto Rico. Witmer's paper on Native American amicus briefs in the U.S. Supreme Court was co-authored with Joshua Johnson, PhD, BA'08. Their research findings suggest that Native Americans use interest-group strategies, including the submission of amicus briefs, on salient Native cases before the Supreme Court. A second paper examined Native Americans' trust in federal and tribal governments. Witmer and co-authors identify higher levels of trust in tribal governments when compared to relatively low levels of trust in the federal government.
