Faculty Development Grant Presentations April 2-3



Woodley Published in Journal of Fixed Income

Melissa Woodley, PhD, associate professor of finance, published "<u>Managing Duration and Tax</u> <u>Risk in Municipal Bond Portfolios</u>" in *The Journal of Fixed Income*. Her research explores how mutual funds manage the tax risks associated with municipal bonds, particularly their preference for bonds with greater protection from unfavorable tax treatment.

Gallagher Editorial Published in The Lancet

Christopher Gallagher, MD, adjunct professor of medicine and division chief of endocrinology, published an editorial in *The Lancet* discussing a new large-scale study that found vitamin D does not significantly prevent acute respiratory infections (ARIs), challenging a common belief about its immune benefits. However, Gallagher calls for a large, well-designed trial to determine whether low-dose vitamin D supplementation could still benefit those with low vitamin D levels, particularly in winter months

Shipman Delivers Grand Rounds Lecture at University of Iowa
