Health Policy Seminar Series

The Institute for Population Health (IPH) will launch a Health Policy Seminar Series in collaboration with the School of Medicine this fall. The first seminar will be held in early September featuring Jeanne Lambrew, PhD, director of health care reform and a senior fellow at The Century Foundation. Lambrew served as a senior official in President Obama's administration, first as director of the Office of Health Reform at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, where she worked on passage of the landmark Affordable Care Act, and then, from 2011 to the end of his administration, she served as President Obama's deputy assistant for health policy, guiding the implementation of the ACA as well as initiatives to improve the quality and value of Medicare, Medicaid, the Children's Health Insurance Program, and public health.
